What is the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA)?

In a perfect world, everyone would qualify for full financial aid. However, in reality, those pools of funds are limited, and there must be a way of determining who really needs financial assistance to attend college.

That's where the FAFSA—the Free Application for Federal Student Aid—comes in. Almost like Hogwarts' Sorting Hat, it sorts out which students are eligible for what types of financial aid, and how much.

What is the FAFSA?

At its core, the <u>FAFSA</u> is just a form you fill out to see if you're eligible for undergraduate or graduate financial aid. The FAFSA is administered by the Department of Education, and the results that it presents are then given to your college or university's financial aid office. It assesses your and your family's financial situation to determine how much you can afford to pay for college. If you're a <u>dependent student</u>, you'll need to fill this form out with your parents. If you're an independent student, you may not need your parent's input on this form; however, you will need your spouse's information if you're married.

When you've completed the form, it will generate a Student Aid Report (SAR) which details your Expected Family Contribution (EFC) to your education. When you first see this number, you might panic because it's so large, but know this: it's *not* how much money your family *has* to pay. Rather, it's a number that your school will use to determine your eligibility for federal, state, and private financial aid (such as scholarships).

To figure out how much financial aid you're eligible to receive, your school will subtract your EFC from the average Cost of Attendance (COA). The bigger the difference, the more financial aid you will receive. For example, if your school's COA is \$40,000 per year and your EFC is \$30,000 per year, you'll be eligible for \$10,000 worth of financial aid.

Should I fill out the FAFSA?

Yes! The only way to know for sure whether you qualify for governmental aid is to complete the FAFSA. While the amount of financial aid you qualify for depends on many, many factors, it's generally always a good idea to check your eligibility. Even if you only qualify for federal subsidized student loans, that can still help you minimize your debt burden in the long run.

How do I fill out the FAFSA?

You can complete the application yourself with the link below or I would personally call or visit with a representative from Education Quest to help you work through the process. It is very quick and they will help you get it right the first time. You will need your 2019 tax returns for the process. The Susan T. Buffett Scholarship

Eligibility and Selection

The Susan T. Buffett Foundation Scholarship

The Susan T. Buffett Foundation Scholarship application for the 2021-2022 academic year opened Sunday, November 1st. Here is the <u>link</u> to the application.

- Due to the pandemic, we have made a change to an eligibility requirement for the Buffett Scholarship along with a few changes to the scholarship application. Please see below for these changes and other important information:
- GPA eligibility requirement
 - Students must have at least a 2.0 unweighted cumulative GPA
 - More of your students will be eligible to apply
- Application changes
 - One professional recommendation is required (not two)
 - Fewer essay questions and smaller word count (the questions are on our website <u>https://buffettscholarships.org/application-requirements</u>)
 - ACT superscoring if students take the ACT more than once, they can report their highest subtest scores in the application
- FAFSA
 - Students need to complete the FAFSA early, preferably before the new year
 - Early FAFSA completion is especially vital if a student's financial situation changed significantly this year compared to what is reflected on their federal income tax return. Student in this scenario need to:
- 1) Complete the FAFSA

2) Contact the financial aid office of the college they plan to attend to discuss their change in financial circumstances. The student will need to file a special circumstances appeal, and the college's financial aid office will decide if the student's financial aid can be adjusted.

To be eligible for the **Susan T. Buffett scholarship**, you must:

- Live in Nebraska and meet in state residency requirements of the college you plan to attend
 - DACA, undocumented, or DACA eligible students are still eligible to apply
 - For questions about your residency status, here is a list of contact numbers

- Graduate from a Nebraska high school or earn a Nebraska GED
- Achieve at least a 2.0 cumulative unweighted GPA in high school
 - 2.0 on a 4 point scale
- Be a first-time freshman when entering college
 - Students obtaining dual enrollment credits in high school are still eligible to apply
- Plan to attend a Nebraska public college:
 - NE Community Colleges CCC, LPTC, MCC, MPCC, NECC, NICC, SCC, or WNCC;
 - NE State College System Chadron State, Peru State, Wayne State; or
 - University of NE System NCTA, UNK, UNL, UNMC, or UNO
- Be in need of financial assistance in order to attend college
 - Note: You do not need to be Pell Grant eligible to qualify
 - You must have an Expected Family Contribution (EFC) below \$10,000

All eligible applications are reviewed and scored. Selection is based on:

- Financial need
- Academic merit
- Personal essay
- Recommendation

The Susan T. Buffett Scholarship Application Checklist

- □ Social Security number* (if you have one)
- □ Username and password (write these down)
- Online application forms
- □ One recommendation
 - For the recommender you will need:
 - Full name, title, email, and phone number

□ Student Aid Report (SAR)

- You and parent/guardian will need FSA IDs
- The PDF download of the SAR must be 5 pages
- EFC must contain a number between 0 & 9,999
- □ High school transcript in PDF format

It must include the following:

- Full name, date of birth, and high school name
- Cumulative unweighted GPA
- High school coursework with grades
- Current work in progress

□ Essay (500 to 1000 words)

Address all of these questions/topics:

- Tell us about you, your life, your family and/or your communities. (In your response, discuss people, communities/organizations, and experiences that have shaped your life and your values).
- Tell us about a time you worked hard to achieve something <u>in school</u> and why it was meaningful/what you learned. Additionally, tell us about a time you worked hard to achieve something <u>outside of school</u> and why it was meaningful/what you learned.
- 3. Tell us why you want to go to college. How will this scholarship help you reach your goals?

Consent form

When you are ready to submit the application:

- Read the online consent form
- Complete your electronic signature
- Obtain parent/guardian electronic signature (if you are under 19 years of age)

*If you were granted Deferred Action status as a result of the 2012 U.S. Department of Homeland Security initiative or cannot file the FAFSA because of your citizenship status, please contact the Buffett Foundation at <u>scholarships@stbfoundation.org</u> to inform them of your status. SEM Passport Program for Juniors and Seniors

The SEM Passport is an incentive for our students to complete needed tasks for the year and better prepare themselves for college or a career choice. It was designed for students to complete needed activities using a passport theme and to "stamp" completed activities just like a passport when traveling abroad. This is the first year juniors are participating in the activity. Juniors and seniors that complete the necessary activities will be put into a drawing for a scholarship that will be announced at our Honors Night in the spring. Seniors that complete the activities will also receive a "College Survival Package."

Eligibility Requirements

- 1. ACT and SAT scores **are not** required.
- 2. Must be a U.S. Citizen.
- 3. Must attend an Eligible Public High School.
- 4. Must have achieved a 3.75 Cumulative Grade Point Average.
- 5. Must enroll at an Eligible Four-Year College or University the first semester following high school graduation.
- 6. Must work 240 hours before August 2021.
- 7. FAFSA EFC must not exceed \$6,500.

- 8. Must apply for Federal and State grants if eligible.
- 9. Must not have a felony conviction.
